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CHABAD, HILLEL TO MERGE ON U. S. CAMPUSES; NEW ORGANIZATION TO BE NAMED "CHILLUL"

FAIR LAWN, March 7—As a direct result of the belt tightening mood inspired by President Bill Clinton's economic message, leaders of two major Jewish student organizations agreed today to join forces. They will put aside their differences and create a single new organization to serve the needs of Jewish students on America's university campuses.

During an all-night negotiating session, representatives of the Lubavitcher Rebbe Shlita and the B'nai B'rith Shlita agreed on a name for the new group.

**CHILLUL**

It happened after the Chabad leaders heard that the Hillel organization on campus includes Reform and Conservative rabbis, some of whom are women, and they said, "This is a real Chillul." B'nai B'rith leaders, reacting to this statement, assumed that Chabad was suggesting a new name and immediately voiced support for it.

Having reached agreement, the leaders of both groups voiced their hopes for success of the new organization. However, a dissident group of new Chabad Baalei Teshuva is refusing to give up their independence. At a hurriedly convened news conference, they announced that they will be forming a spin-off of Chillul. Using Chabad's childrens' organization, Tzivos Hashem, as a model, these dissidents have decided to call their separatist group "Chillul Hashem."

Early reaction from campuses in the Northeast has been generally positive. At Rutgers, students expressed relief that they would no longer have to choose which Ice Cream Social to attend; in previous years, Hillel and Chabad have run competing events on the same night.

Kronikle attempts to get student reactions from Boston University and the University of Michigan were unsuccessful because students were in the midst of spring break and hamantash baking.
